Once again it has been a great pleasure to represent WAB on The National Council of

Women of SA Inc., it is a wonderful organisation and does amazing work for the women and children of South Australia.

This year we have advocated strongly for affordable housing, it is needed more than ever with the soaring prices of housing and rent at present, everywhere around the state. Many women are homeless and many more are experiencing housing insecurity, it is a huge issue and is one we will not let the government forget about.

We invited Grant Stevens, Commissioner of Police, to speak about Domestic Violence in South Australia. Sadly he said that his whole police force could spend all their time on this problem alone and that Covid19 had only made that very bad situation worse.

We were fortunate to visit Red Cross SA and learn about the valuable work they are doing here in South Australia. The CEO is a young man who grew up in Kimba, Jai O'Toole, and he gave us a great overview of his position and pointed out that their work far exceeds "Bloods and Floods" as is so often thought.

This is 120th year of NCWSA and we are planning to celebrate our long and vibrant history.

Covid-19 pandemic – Looking Back - how did we manage?

Background

Half way through 2019, I heard an interview on ABC radio about an organisation called Good Things Foundation, who with federal funding, were conducting nationwide computer/electronic device courses called Be Connected. This initiative was introduced to help Over 50's Australians to grasp today's technology so they don't get left behind. Network Partners, such as WAB, could apply for Grants to deliver these courses. This appealed to me as I was surprised at how many members, could not use email and I wanted to address this shortfall.

After going through the process of applying for funding and planning to deliver three day courses at WAB branch locations, arrangements were put in place. Kalangadoo was the first on the schedule and this went ahead in February 2020, closely followed by Padthaway in the same month.

At the end of 2019, it was being reported that a viral disease was spreading throughout Asia and Europe which seemed so far away to us in Australia. Then in March 2020, everything changed as our government announced that Covid had arrived in Australia travel restricted, as State borders were closed under Police guard, in an attempt to prevent the disease from spreading. All residents were asked to *stay at home*. Wearing of face masked was instigated, signing in for contact tracing when entering supermarkets, chemists etc. and of course using hand sanitiser entering and exiting these premises. SA Police allocated maximum numbers allowed at gatherings etc. and many WAB meetings were not able to be held.

So what do we do? How do we support each other? *Let's do coffee!* was born where fortnightly Zoom social gatherings were held. We chatted on a theme, shared what we were eating with our morning coffee. We kept in touch to support with each other. Then in July, intra-state travel was allowed and the Be Connected program recommended.

Be Connected – IT training

In 2020, courses were held for Kalangadoo, Padthaway, Paringa, Cunliffe, Lochaber, Coonalpyn/Yurgo branches. At their request, a course was also delivered to CWA Naracoorte who had heard about the happenings in WAB. It was a wonderful experience travelling to these branches and getting to know members over the three days.

Another initiative of Good Things Foundation is Get Online Week which is held annually. WAB has participated in two events:

Associated Women of the World

30th Triennial World Conference, Kuala Lumpur, Malaysia - May 2023.

More than 450 delegates from all over the world attended the recent World Conference including three WAB members, Sandra Young, Debbie Guenther, myself and my spouse. 164 attendees were Australian.

Covid has had a profound impact on the work of ACWW making meetings difficult and to visit communities, however our theme for the triennium was 'Our Strength is our Diversity' and World President, Magdie de Kock, has been challenged to be both strong and diverse to find ways to carry on in difficult times.

The conference was opened by the HM King of Malaysia, accompanied by HM Queen Azizah and their son Prince Regent of Pahang Hassanal who was our keynote speaker. There are many changes within ACWW. Instead of having committees, it is now the responsibility of a Co-Ordinator to channel needs and information within their area, to work with the Area President and support them. Each society appoints one person to be their co-ordinator, generally the International Officer, currently myself. Incoming Area President South Pacific is Lyn Braico from CWA NSW. The next area conference is to be held in Griffith in September 2024.

In future we will only have 3 projects at any given time to enable more funds to be invested making projects more sustainable. "Coins for Friendship" has been changed to **Rural Women in Action Fund**, this change has been made to encourage more generous giving, a revised form is on the WAB website. Please continue to create opportunities to raise money for this fund so that we can support the work of ACWW.

If you want to receive a copy of the Area President's reports, an email must be sent to ACWW giving them permission to send it to you, the privacy laws in UK are different from Australia! Their current address is The Foundry, 17 Oval Way, London SE11 5RR.

There were only three resolutions at conference on topics other than the constitution!

The Rural Women of New Zealand proposed the establishment of a Rural Women's Employment Action Plan to address the particular needs of rural women to ensure access to training and education, fair, equitable and safe employment practices, working conditions and remuneration, access to resources such as finance, materials, technology, career advice etc.

Rural Women of NZ also proposed that ACWW urge Governments to apply both a Rural Impact Analysis and Gender Impact Analysis when considering plans, policies and programmes to ensure the intersectionality of being women and living rurally are taken into account in order to reduce the adverse impact of any plans, policies or programmes on rural communities.

The third resolution was proposed by the National Association for Family and Community Education, USA, asking that ACWW facilitates both action and advocacy on the issue of food waste, recognising that food waste occurs throughout the global food supply chain, and that coordinated action is required to mitigate food loss and wastage at every stage. All three resolutions passed.

The next conference is to be held in Ottowa, Canada in April 2026. The Centenary of ACWW will be celebrated in 2029 and we are encouraged to give ideas of how that should be celebrated.

The highlight of the conference was the Gala Dinner held at The Royal Palace, 6 double decker buses transported us there with police escort (as we had everywhere we went!!) After we went through security we entered the Palace which was just as beautiful as you can imagine! Dinner was served in a huge room with a head table of approximately 30 people, each with their own waiter and 50+ tables of our group – the Queen had invited other Royal guests and some family and friends – a total of over 600 people all seated and tables beautifully set with magnificent china. We were waited on by students from a local school, a four course meal was served and the food was divine. During the meal there was continuous entertainment with dancing, singing and an orchestra.


